Our Foggy Bottom campus community enthusiastically greeted the 2022-2023 school year, with health restrictions lifted amidst a more reassuring backdrop of normalcy. We were a small, but mighty cohort —pursuing and conquering their internship year with excitement and enthusiasm in both internships and rigorous coursework. As we have all read in the news, we have been facing a teacher shortage since the onset of Covid. Many K-12 teachers are exiting their classrooms with the increase in responsibilities lying outside of their expertise and the inevitably of facing the first unknowns of their kind in their teaching careers.

As such, enrollments in teacher preparation programs have struggled with declining enrollments with the country's teacher workforce facing a comparable reduction. Reports reaching us are that the teaching profession is facing a post-pandemic crisis of a teacher shortage for years to come. We continue to press our case to be a fully accredited program that recruits and graduates exceptionally skilled teachers who are more than capable and prepared to teach children in today's classrooms.

During the last fiscal year, the Beck Endowment fund benefited from a modest growth through gifts from our generous donors. As in past years, we plan to provide Beck Endowment scholarships to our Elementary Education students, continue an active scholarship campaign, and know that our alumni and friends will stay in touch and lend their support as we embark on the Beck Endowment's twenty-seventh year of operation.
